Education Week

Recently *Education Week* published their 17th annual Quality Counts report on safety, discipline, and school climate. They noted, "National initiatives to improve schools tend to focus heavily on curriculum, testing, and personnel. But a growing consensus also recognizes that the elements that make up school climate—including peer relationships, students' sense of safety and security, and the disciplinary policies and practices they confront each day—play a crucial part in laying the groundwork for academic success. Those factors, along with resources and the ability of school staff members to meet students' needs, are seen as especially important for low-performing schools and at-risk students." Additionally there is information about discipline more focused on righting wrongs than punishment called "Restorative Justice," which is gaining steam in both the courts and schools. This publication requires a subscription but some of the articles are free. We suggest you check it out.

Iowa Department of Education

The Iowa Department of Education provides an array of safe schools resources including, among others, a guide to manage threatening situations, a leadership handbook, and safety tips as well as links to other resources. Another page on the DE website also provides resources including a school self-assessment and threatening situation reporting materials.

National Association of School Psychologists

Below is a list of 15 components compiled from the research by the staff at the Yale Child Study Center. These elements characterize a healthy, supportive school climate (Haynes, Emmons, Ben-Avie, & Comer, 1996). As you read each component or discuss them in your leadership team, ask yourself, "What do we do to make sure this is happening in our school?"

- Achievement motivation: Students at the school believe they can learn and are willing to learn.
- Collaborative decision making: Parents, students, and staff are actively involved in the decisions affecting the school.
- Equity and fairness: Students are treated equally regardless of ethnicity, gender, and disability.
- General school climate: There is a positive quality of all interactions and feelings of trust and respect within the school community.
- Order and discipline: Students display appropriate behavior in the school setting.
- Parent involvement: Parents participate frequently in school activities.
- School-community relations: The community is supportive and involved in the life of the school.
- Dedication to student learning: Teachers actively motivate students to learn.
- Staff expectations: Staff expects that students will succeed in school and in life.
- Leadership: The principal effectively guides the direction of the school, including creating a positive climate.
- School building: The physical appearance of the school building reflects respect for the school and community.
- Sharing of resources: All students have equal opportunity to participate in school activities, materials, and equipment.
- Caring and sensitivity: The principal shows consideration for the students, parents, and school staff.
- Student interpersonal relations: There is a high level of caring, respect, and trust among students in the school.
- Student-teacher relations: There is a high level of caring, respect and trust between students and teachers in the school.

Mapquest 4 Mobile: Given the traveling I do around our great state, I've tried many navigation apps, but I prefer Mapquest. It's as useful on my iPhone (also available for Android devices) as it is on my computer. Gives voice directions and is easy to operate.

Public Broadcasting System: We don't even know where to start describing what's available at the PBS website. There are free videos about history, current events, and news stories. A plethora of content is available for classroom use, as well as just plain old learning for us adults.

Newseum: The Newseum in Washington, D.C. is described this way. "The Newseum — a 250,000-square-foot museum of news — offers visitors an experience that blends five centuries of news history with up-to-the-second technology and hands-on exhibits." Michael Gartner of Iowa is on the board of directors. Their website also has a digital classroom feature, providing lesson plans and many other resources.

Skills Iowa Support for Summer Learning

Last summer Skills Iowa provided a class in a local district where teachers received recertification credit. We thought more of you might find this useful, so we are offering these classes this summer at your school sites if you are interested. You are certainly welcome to invite other districts in your area to participate.

- Skills Iowa Looks at Student Work: This class would be facilitated by Susan Westlund and Susie Olesen. It would assist schools in using the Skills Iowa data as a stepping off point into a deeper examination of student learning. Additional focus would be on strengthening the implementation of your collaborative teams, helping participants learn how to provide honest and forthright feedback in the collaborative process.
- Using Skills Iowa to Get the Data You Need: This class would be facilitated by your trainer and/or Susie Olesen and would help teachers be more familiar with all of the reports available through Skills Iowa and how Skills Iowa can be used to facilitate the work of your collaborative teams.
